AASHTO Roundtable Session: 'Centering Safety':

A roundtable session at the 2025 Transportation Research Board Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C., featured a cross section of state department of transportation chief executives discussing how the DOT community continues to make safety a core focus of the infrastructure work under their purview.

The session also delved into how making the nation's road network safer for all roadway users – including pedestrians, bicyclists, highway workers, and others – often requires a look beyond solely infrastructure solutions to the need for behavioral changes as well.

Roadway safety continues to be a public health crisis in the U.S.," stressed session moderator Garrett Eucalitto, commissioner of the Connecticut DOT and the 2024-2025 AASTO President. "Doing "better" means building a more robust safety culture across the transportation industry while collaborating with more public and private sector partners."

"The old adage is that if you talk the talk, you must walk the walk," stressed Joel Jundt, secretary of the SDDOT. "What are we doing as state DOTs to change this? We can all stand up here and say 'change the behavior,' but if we don't make behavior changes [while driving] ourselves, then we are just as guilty. We must hold ourselves accountable first."

Using data is also key to helping communities encourage changes to driver behavior, as well as accept the deployment of proven safety infrastructure, he said.

"Data-driven is the key to help the public understand the 'why' behind the safety efforts," he said. That includes regularly communicating with the public to get "buy-in" regarding infrastructure projects, especially ones aimed at improving safety, Jundt noted.

Legislative Session Update

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Governor Noem gave the 2025 State of the State address for the 100th session of the South Dakota State Legislature on Tuesday, Jan. 14, 2025. The Governor noted the dedicated work of SDDOT to keep South Dakotans safe.

"During the 1,000-year flood, several agencies stepped up to respond: at my direction, the South Dakota Department of Public Safety sent Highway Patrol and an Incident Management Assistance Team; the Department of Game, Fish & Parks deployed conservation officers to conduct boat rescues; the **Department of Transportation handled traffic control, detours, and helped construct a levee across the Interstate in just hours in accordance with the city's flood plan** . . . I want to thank all of the emergency responders, volunteers, local governments, and state employees whose quick and professional actions prevented further damage."

SDDOT has three agency bills this legislative session:

<u>SB38</u> Modify requirement for a vehicle approaching a vehicle that is stopped or occupying the shoulder of the highway with warning lights flashing.

<u>SB39</u> Revise the description of highways included in the state truck highway system.

<u>SB40</u> Revise Department of Transportation regulatory authority regarding aeronautics.

The Department will be reviewing all bills proposed during the legislative session and will watch those that could affect SDDOT. Secretary Jundt will continue to provide legislative updates through the weekly Information Interchange emails.

Finance Corner The Importance of Internal Controls

Internal controls should be followed by all South Dakota Department of Transportation (SDDOT) employees. Internal controls provide reasonable assurance of effective and efficient operations, reliability of financial reporting, and compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

TRANSACTION TYPES: EXPENDITURES, TRAVEL RECORDS, TIMESHEETS, VENDOR INVOICES

- An employee may not order, receive, and approve a voucher for the same transaction.
- State assets should be used for strictly legitimate SDDOT purposes.
- An employee must not directly or indirectly, knowingly falsify, cause, or allow to be falsified any book, record, or account of the state.
- Every voucher must have an authorized signer.
- State purchasing cards must only be used by the person who was issued the card.

State assets must be protected. Theft, misuse, or waste of State assets is grounds for disciplinary action!

January is National Mentoring Month. SDDOT has one of the best mentoring programs!

The SDDOT Mentoring program is a great way to explore the vast opportunities and resources available within the DOT. SDDOT has one of the best mentoring program. It was designed to help participants:

- Improve their skills, knowledge, and network;
- Take an active role in their individual career and leadership development;
- Recognize skills needed for success and find developmental opportunities to develop those skills;
- Gain an understanding of organizational values, relationships, and unwritten rules; and

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• Increase exposure and access to other employees throughout the organization.

The **Mentoring Program** is **mentee driven**, meaning mentees decide what goals and objectives they may want to accomplish during the program year and the **committee** selects the **best mentor** (along with your input) to achieve the goals. The program is open to **ALL** employees who have completed their probationary period. The maximum benefit of the program is best achieved after employees have a firm understanding of their current position, usually one year, but that is not an excluding factor.

Variable Speed Limit Bill Passed and Contract for Construction Set



Michael Behm, Director of Planning and Engineering, received the construction contract for the Variable Speed Limit (VSL) construction project on Tuesday, Dec. 31, 2024. This signified the green light to start the project.

In the picture to the left is **Cabinet Secretary Joel Jundt** holding SB21 from the 2020 Legislative session which gave the SDDOT the authority to use VSL. **Dave Huft, Intelligent Transportation Systems Engineer Manager,** is holding the contract for construction for the SDDOT to execute.

"There was a lot of work to get this bill passed. The picture goes to show that ideas can become a reality, but rely on a solid vision and a lot of perseverance," said Behm.

Initiating and implementing new ideas or methods to create value is one of SDDOT's core values. Innovation lies at the heart of these improvement efforts and one of the many places in the Department this innovation can be found is in project design. Continually striving for safer and more efficient designs to better serve the public is what drives new project designs.

Variable Speed Limits:

Two corridors in South Dakota will soon have variable speed limit zones. The first is designated for Interstate 29 between Flandreau and Brookings. This project is scheduled to begin in 2025. The second corridor to feature a variable speed zone will be located on Interstate 90 between Sturgis and Tilford to follow.

The variable speed system works by using sensors to detect temperature, pavement conditions, traffic counts, and other relevant information to provide a recommended speed limit to SDDOT staff. As applicable, speed limits will be reduced during winter weather events and then reset as conditions allow.



Media/Public Engagement Training


In January, the communications team provided media/public engagement training for SDDOT employees.

- 996 Closure Forms An Excel document located at: <u>M: Drive DOT Common All DOT Forms</u> <u>– DOT Form 900-1500</u>
 - Please do not submit a closure form until the Work Order is completed.
 - Especially if there is more than one PCN this ensures that the whole work order gets closed properly and nothing is left out.
 - When closing the Work Order we will need to include the following.
 - 996 Form for each PCN (for older retainer numbers, please include 996 forms for the Prime and Sub as well)
 - We are also requesting that if there is ANY money left whether fixed fee or max limiting that there is a letter/email from the consultant stating that they are no longer claiming any more max limiting or fixed fee.
 - This ensures that they cannot come back after closure and claim anything else.
 - Have you noticed the new little check box at the bottom of the 996 forms?
 - This box is there to check to ensure the completion of the Consultant Evaluation because this is a mandatory item under 23 CFR 172.9(d)(2) and yes, we will be checking this from here on out.
 - If this box is not marked, we will be asking and will not close until proof of evaluation.
- **121 Forms/Amendments** Located at (<u>M: Drive DOT Common All DOT Forms DOT Forms</u> <u>101-199</u>) – there is a fillable PDF document and a Word document with instructions.
 - Please send a 121 with ALL amendments Including time extensions
 - For time extensions we will accept email communication from the Consultant and DOT Project Manager – Please ensure to include the following:
 - Why?
 - Time extension duration?
 - DOT Project Manager acceptance (in a reply via email or letter)
 - Then add the 121.

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• This will help everyone keep track of amendment numbers.

SD SDDOT SAFETY NEWS

American Heart Month

If you didn't know, February is American Heart Month. February is a time where all people are encouraged to focus on their cardiovascular health. According to the <u>U.S. Centers for Disease</u> <u>Control and Prevention</u>, heart disease is the leading cause of death for men, women, and people of most racial and ethnic groups in the United States. In 2022, 1 in every 5 deaths in the United States was caused by heart disease.

You may think that heart disease is an inherited illness, but heart disease is primarily a problem that can be controlled by developing healthy habits.

EXERCISE

Each week, get 2 ½ hours of moderate activity or 75 minutes of more intense activity, spread out over the week.

- Examples of moderate activity are brisk walking or gardening
- Examples of intense activity are running, swimming laps or biking

Some activity is better than none. Work your way up to the recommended number of minutes per week.

EAT HEART-HEALTHY FOODS AND MAINTAIN A HEALTHY WEIGHT

Heart healthy foods are high in nutrition, low in saturated fat and cholesterol. Eat more of:

- Lean meats like poultry and fish, or lean cuts of beef
- Fruits and vegetables, which can be fresh, canned or frozen
- Whole grains, nuts and beans

Avoid food and drinks that are high in sodium, added sugar, or fat.

Limit foods that are high in fat, calories and cholesterol to special treats like a birthday dinner. Avoid alcohol or drink alcohol in moderation, which means one drink a day for women and two drinks a day for men. If you are overweight, ask your doctor to recommend a healthy goal weight and dietary changes to make.

REDUCE STRESS

If you are feeling stressed at work, talk to your supervisor about it. If that's not an option, consider discussing the issue with your doctor or utilize the services provided through the <u>Employee Assistance Program.</u>

- Get enough sleep; most adults need 7 to 9 hours of sleep every day
- Disconnect from your smart phone, computer, tablet, or smart watch, when on personal time. 24/7 connectivity is stressful
- Take time for yourself to work on a hobby, do something fun with family or friends

Winter Safety - Parking Lot Tips and Tricks **By: Carol Evans, Region Safety Coordinator**

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There has been several employee slip and falls in parking lots this winter. Parking lot conditions change throughout the day and night, with the snow, thaw, and refreezing conditions.

I carry a salt shaker in my car to salt my way to and from my vehicle. It is simple, just fill the clean dry water container with sidewalk salt, it fits nicely in your vehicles cup holder and is handy to grab and shake salt out in front of you as you walk if needed. It gives you some grit/grip and will melt the ice and snow for a safe return to your vehicle.

To prevent slips and falls on ice, you can:

- Wear proper shoes: Wear flat shoes with non-slip soles or attach shoe ice grips to the bottom of your shoes. Avoid high-heeled shoes or leather-soled shoes.
- Walk carefully: Walk slowly and take shorter steps, keeping your center of gravity over your front leg. Point your toes outward and keep your feet flat on the around.
- Use handrails: Use handrails when walking up or down stairs, or along a sloping walkway. @
- Keep your hands free: Keep your hands out of your pockets so you can use them for balance.
- Walk on designated walkways: Walk on walkways that have been salted or treated for ice.
- Clean spills immediately: Clean spills as soon as they happen to keep the floor safe. @
- Provide adequate lighting: Make sure areas are well-lit so you can see where you are going.

Use ice cleats if possible. There are several kinds available (see photos) that are easy to use. The first pair are simple and you can just slide them around to the top of the shoe once in the building while the second pair fit onto your foot wear and will need to be removed once safely inside.

A Two and a Half Year Hair Donation Journey

A journey that started over two and a half years ago finally came due! Darren Hall, Pierre Transit Asset Specialist, was able to grow his hair long enough to donate to Locks of Love.

If you are unfamiliar with Locks of Love, it is a charity that started around 1997 and is devoted to helping children and adults up to 21 years old who suffer from medical hair loss.

It takes eight to 10 donated ponytails to make one hairpiece for a child. Ponytails have to be at least 10 inches long to donate. Shorter ponytails and gray hair donations are sold to offset the manufacturing costs of the hairpieces.

People can become sponsors to help produce the hairpieces. A donation of \$1,250 or more can support a Locks of Love child.

"Like most of you, I have known friends and family who have lost hair due to cancer treatment. Two of my close friends suffered from this, which motivated me to give. Special thanks to A Cut in Style, who did a fantastic job with the haircut," said Hall.
